ABOUT THE COUNT

The Stella Prize, in conjunction with Books+Publishing, has compiled Australian statistics for 2012 showing how many books by men and women were reviewed in most of our major newspapers and literary magazines.

The 2012 red and blue pie charts below – which are modelled on those produced by US-based organisation VIDA¹ – reveal that a significantly higher proportion of books by male authors were reviewed than books by female authors, and that little has changed from 2011² in terms of the underrepresentation of Australian women's books on the review pages. In fact, in some cases the statistics are worse.










Australian Capital Territory newspapers




New South Wales newspapers








Queensland newspapers
